1. Competition Categories

The competition is divided into **Open Category** and **Professional Category**, catering to string players of different skill levels.

Open Category: Open to all string music enthusiasts, encouraging individuals, ensembles, or orchestras to showcase their musical talents.

<u>Professional Category</u>: Designed for musicians who study or work professionally with string instruments, aiming to select and recognize outstanding string talent.

1.1 Open Category

- ◆ Group A: Born on or after September 1, 2017 (Under 8 years old)
- ◆ Group B: Born between September 1, 2013 September 1, 2017 (9-11 years old)
- ♦ Group C: Born between September 1, 2007 September 1, 2013 (12–17 years old)
- ◆ Group D: Born between September 1, 1996 September 1, 2007 (18–28 years old)

1.2 Professional Category

- ◆ Group A: Born between September 1, 2007 September 1, 2013 (12-17 years old)
- ◆ Group B: Born between September 1, 1996 September 1, 2007 (18-28 years old)

- Participants in the Open Category may choose to compete in the Professional Category,
 but Professional Category participants may not compete in the Open Category.
- ◆ Participants may choose to compete in an older age group, but participants in an older age group may not compete in a younger age group.
- ◆ The final interpretation of all competition rules rests with the competition organizing committee.



2.1 Open Category

- ♦ Group A (Under 8 years old): Perform one piece, duration 3–6 minutes.
- ♦ Group B (9–11 years old): Perform one piece, duration up to 8 minutes.
- ♦ Group C (12–17 years old): Perform one piece, duration up to 10 minutes.
- ♦ Group D (18–28 years old): Perform one piece, duration up to 10 minutes.

2.2 Professional Category

♦ Group A (12–17 years old)

Round 1: One movement from Bach's Solo Violin Sonatas or Partitas.

Mozart Violin Concerto (2nd movement from Concerto No. 3, 4, or 5) or

Mozart Adagio.

One Violin Caprice from Rode, Dont (Op.35), Wieniawski (Op.10 or Op.18),

Paganini, etc.

Round 2: One movement (excluding slow movements) from a Romantic or later violin

concerto, or a medium-to-large-scale virtuoso piece.

♦ Group B (18-28 years old)

Round 1: One movement from Bach's Solo Violin Sonatas or Partitas.

Mozart Violin Concerto (1st movement from Concerto No. 1, 2, 3, 4, or 5).

One Violin Caprice from Rode, Dont (Op.35), Wieniawski (Op.10 or Op.18),

Paganini, etc.

Round 2: One movement (excluding slow movements) from a Romantic or later violin

concerto, or a medium-to-large-scale virtuoso piece.



3. Important Notes

- ◆ Each round's performance duration must not exceed 15 minutes. The jury has the right to stop the performance due to time constraints, but this will not affect the participant's evaluation.
- ♦ If a competition piece includes a piano accompaniment, the participant must perform with a piano accompaniment.



(Viola)

One virtuosic étude or caprice

Round 2: Choose the first movement from one of the following concertos or sonatas

Glinka Sonata in D minor

Hummel Sonata in E-flat major

Handel Concerto in B minor

Bach Concerto in C minor

Hoffmeister Concerto in D major

Stamitz Concerto in D major

Rolla Concerto in E-flat major

Schubert Concerto in C major

♦ Group B (18-28 years old)



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Round 1: One movement from Bach Cello Suites Nos. 4–6 (viola version)

One concert piece or virtuosic piece

Round 2: Choose the first movement from one of the following works

Schubert "Arpeggione" Sonata in A minor

Brahms Sonata in F minor or E-flat major

Clarke Viola Sonata

Bartók Viola Concerto

Walton Viola Concerto

Bowen Viola Concerto

Miklós Viola Concerto

Hindemith "Der Schwanendreher"

Round 1: Choose one étude or technical study by Duport or Popper(e.g.):

"Spinning Wheel" from Pieces Op.55

"Butterfly"

Duport: 21 Études for Cello

Round 2: Choose one movement from a cello concerto of the Classical or Romantic

period(e.g.):

Haydn: Cello Concerto in C major, 1st movement

Saint-Saëns: Cello Concerto in A minor, 1st movement

Lalo: Cello Concerto in D minor, 1st movement

♦ Group B (18-28 years old)

Round 1: Select one étude or a movement from études by Piatti (e.g.):

"Dance of the Elves" Op.39 ("La Danse des Elfes")



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"Flight of the Bumblebee"

Piatti: 12 Caprices for Solo Cello

Round 2:

Select one movement from a cello concerto of the Classical or Romantic period

(e.g.):

Elgar: Cello Concerto in E minor, 4th movement

An étude from Popper: 40 Studies for Cello, Op.73

(Double Bass)

- ◆ Group B: Born between September 1, 2007 September 1, 2013 (12-17 years old)

1.2 Professional Category

- ◆ Group A: Born between September 1, 2007 − September 1, 2013 (12–17 years old)
- ◆ Group B: Born between September 1, 1996 September 1, 2007 (18–28 years old)

2.2 Professional Category

- ◆ Group A (12–17 years old)
- ♦ Group B (18-28 years old)

Round 1: Play two contrasting movements or pieces of the concertos, sonatas and short virtuoso works of the double bass repertoire

Round 2: Play two contrasting movements or pieces of the concertos, sonatas and short virtuoso works of the double bass repertoire (different from Round 1)

3. Important Notes

- ◆ Each round's performance duration must not exceed 15 minutes. The jury has the right to stop the performance due to time constraints, but this will not affect the participant's evaluation.
- ◆ Flexibility in repertoire is encouraged, provided it meets appropriate technical and artistic standards.
- ◆ If a competition piece includes a piano accompaniment, the participant must perform with a piano accompaniment.

The following works serve as examples; participants may also perform other pieces of comparable difficulty.

Concertos:

- ♦ Karl Ditters von Dittersdorf − Concerto in E Major
- ◆ Giovanni Bottesini Concerto in B Minor / Concerto in F# Minor
- ◆ Johann Baptist Vanhal − Concerto in D Major
- ♦ Sergei Koussevitzky Concerto in F# Minor

Sonatas:

- ♦ Adolf Misek Sonata No. 1 in A Major / Sonata No. 2 in E Minor
- ◆ Paul Hindemith Sonata for Double Bass
- ♦ Robert Fuchs Sonata in Bb Major

Virtuoso Works:

- ◆ Bottesini Tarantella, Introduction and Gavotte, Allegretto Capriccioso, Capriccio di Bravura, Melody, Elegy, Reverie, Grande Allegro di Concerto
- ♦ Reinhold Glière Intermezzo, Tarantella
- ♦ Koussevitzky Valse Miniature, Chanson Triste



(String Ensemble and Orchestra)

1. Competition Categories

- ◆ String Ensemble Group A (3 to 14 members): Average age must not exceed 17 years.
- ♦ String Ensemble Group B (3 to 14 members): Average age between 18 to 28 years.
- String Orchestra Group A (15 members or more): Average age must not exceed 17 years.
- String Orchestra Group B (15 members or more): Average age between 18 to 28 years.
- ◆ Folk String Group

1.1 Competition Rules

- Participants from younger age groups may register for higher age categories; however, participants from higher age groups are not permitted to compete in lower age categories.
- ◆ The competition organizing committee reserves the right of final interpretation of the competition rules.

2. Competition Repertoire Requirements

- ♦ There are no specific repertoire requirements for string ensembles or string orchestras.
- ◆ Each group should prepare one or two pieces with a total performance duration not exceeding 10 minutes.
